KENTUCKY PASSES FIRST REAL ETHICS RESOLUTION IN NATION

The following is a resolution (House Resolution 42) introduced by George D Stumbo, which had 85 sponsors and was passed in the house:

A Resolution adjourning the 1993 Extraordinary Session on Ethics in remembrance and honor of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Ethics.

WHEREAS, on September 17, 1796, President George Washington stated: "Of all the dispositions and habits, which lead to political prosperity, religion and morality are indispensable supports. In

vain would that man claim the tribute of Patriotism, who should labor to subvert these great pillars of human happiness The mere politician ought to respect and to cherish them. A volume could not trace all their connections with private and public felicity, let it simply be asked, Where is the security for prosperity, for reputation, for life, if the

sense of religious obligation desert? And let us with caution indulge the supposition, that morality can be maintained without religion. whatever may be conceded to the influence of refined education on minds reason

and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail, in exclusion of religious principle"; and

WHEREAS, on June 21, 1776, President John Adams wrote: "Statesmen, my dear Sir, may plan and speculate for liberty, but it is Religion and Morality alone, which can establish the Principles upon which Freeman can securely stand....the only foundation of a free Constitution, is pure virtue, and if this cannot be inspired into our People, in a greater Measure, than they have it now,

would our founding fathers have to say about current with State controversies such as prayer in the schools, and the notion that this nation was founded upon the Judeo-fine woral and religious foundation? The fact is that, in the six U.S. Supreme Court cases, the court affirmed that with is a "Christian nation," if not in the practice of most minus, then certainly in its origins and foundation. For the case of Mormon Church v. United States, the Court, speaking of polygamy, said: "It is contrary to minus of Christianity and the civilization that Christianity mediced in the Western world."

acknowledging with reverence the duty of obedience to the will of God ..."

This nation's presidents also have proclaimed that America is built upon a Judeo-Christian moral and religious foundation. For example, President George Washington recognized that religion and belief in God contribute to order in the soul and order in the commonwealth. In his first inaugural address, President Washington declared that we owe gratitude and reverence to "the Great Author of every public and private good," and said that America should "acknowledge and adore the invisible Hand which conducts the affairs of men."

Thomas Jefferson also believed that civilized society cannot endure without religion. Can "liberties of a nation be thought secure," he pondered in 1781, "when we have removed their only firm basis, a conviction in the minds of the people that liberties are a gift from God?"

Abraham Lincoln, too, discerned a nexus between Judeo-Christian values and both the founding and greatness of this nation. That is why he asked his fellow countrymen not to scorn or repudiate the moral and religious foundation of America. Said Lincoln: "We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven; we have grown in numbers, wealth and power, as no other nation has ever known." yet, observed Lincoln, "Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving Grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us."

From the above U.S. Supreme court statements and the declarations of three of this nation's greatest presidents, it is clear that our Founding Fathers would find no problem with prayer in the public schools.
